Yous'll mind on as weel that wuh had a lot o snaa a couple o winters back. Moontins o thi stuff. Whey, this tyel's aboot whaat happened tiv is i thi snaa.

One neet, wor lass went ti see one ov hor freends whe lives in a hoos at thi top o thi hill abeun wor hoos. It wasn't snaain whan she left, like, but it started ti snaa syun eftor, an afore lang it waas canny deep.
