Thomas Bewick Exhibition

There's a fascinating display of Bewick's drawings, blocks and engravings at the Hatton Gallery, Newcastle University, till 22nd January. It focusses on his tailpieces and vignettes, miniature masterpieces reflecting life two hundred years ago. Included is the robust scene "The Pigsty Netty". A query about the title revealed that this was a recently-coined title for identification purposes and unfortunately not an 18th-century written source for "netty". What is the earliest date anyone can find for the word? Also on show is a witty proclamation for a "jubilee" granted to two of his printers in honour of the new century. In these days as we approach the disputed changeover date to a new millennium, it is interesting to note that 200 years ago the new century was thought to begin in 1801 and not the change from 1799 to 1800. Bewick's printers were encouraged to drink "malt liquor", "abstain from all kinds of spirits", eat well and behave in a civilised manner.

Reports and Reviews

Brief mentions of events earlier this year:

At the AGM in May the officers and most committee members were re-elected; congratulations to Bob Bolam who was awarded the Fellowship of the Society for his services to the language, and new Honorary Life Members George Johnson and George Wallace who were rewarded for their work as the Society's branch secretaries. (George Johnson was presented his certificate at a subsequent special "retirement" party at Hexham.) A welcome to Heather Ging who was elected to the main committee.

In June the second **joint meeting** with the Lakeland Dialect Society took place at Lanercost, this time hosted by the NLS. Recitations, raffle and refreshments were provided by both groups and again the Lakeland folk outnumbered the Northumbrians. Next year Lakeland say they will run a different

sort of meeting and venue: we'll keep you posted.

Hexham branch had three well-publicised meetings on poetry. Raymond Reed from Ashington attracted a record two dozen to hear his father's and his own poetry, Katrina Porteous held a spell-bound audience with her extracts from our new publication "The Wund an' the Wetter" and descriptions of her work with the fishing community in Beadnell. The most recent meeting, with Johnny Handle, is reviewed below. Next Hexham meeting: branch AGM the first Wednesday in February. Venue to be fixed. At Alnwick, committee members manned a stall for one day at Alnwick Fair and provided two stage spots, with piping members Brian James, Ann Sessoms and Kim Bibby-Wilson helped by Alasdair Turnbull on fiddle, and Ray Reed reciting. Later a Hot Trod evening to highlight the Society's activities and interests was held, and despite a low turnout it is still hoped to get an active branch going in the North. Brian will be contacting members in the Alnwick/Rothbury/Wooler areas to set up a meeting.


The Society had a presence in September at the Seahouses Sea Shanty Festival, with a wind-swept stall and the launch in the

Second Roland Bibby Memorial Lecture Sat. 9th October, County Hall, Morpeth

A well-attended meeting heard a wide-ranging and very interesting lecture by Ray Stephenson, entitled "Geordies on Wax". This was an illustrated talk by one of Roland Bibby's former teaching colleagues of early recordings of Northumbrian performers mainly from the first three decades of the present


Fred Reed died in 1985 leaving a rich legacy of his native Northumbrian verse. Since his death his reputation has grown. He's been called 'the English Burns', and his work has been compared to that of MacDiarmid. The poetry - with a fiercely optimistic heartbeat in contrast to much of modern poetry's fashionable bleakness - is collected in one volume for the first time.

arly in 1999, poet Katrina Porteous and piper Chris Ormston were commissioned by IRON Press to write new words and music to be performed at the launch of *The Northumborman*, the collected dialect poems of Fred Reed. The result was Chris's melody *Mind Yor Language* - music in dialogue with speech - and a 237 line poem which moves as close to music as the spoken word can.

Many of the illustrations were of music-hall performers, whose songs and sketches were recorded on wax cylinders and shellac discs, and played on a range of authentic equipment from those early days. Whilst it was occasionally difficult to make out everything that was played, it was fascinating to hear the range of accents used by the early music-hall stars. It was also very instructive to hear the differences between the native Northumbrian speakers and the other performers who tried to speak or sing in what they thought was Northumbrian.

One of the highlights of the afternoon was to listen to a very early recording of "The Blaydon Races" using a version of the tune that was clearly different from the one we use today. The original tune was in more of a folk music style than the modern one, which has been made more robust as a result of being used in the music

halls.

What will next year's lecture bring?

An Evening with Johnny Handle Wed. 3rd November, Royal Hotel, Hexham

A very select group attended this evening of entertainment organised by the Hexham branch. Johnny Handle used material from his latest recording "A Good Line of Patter" to illustrate his theme that almost any aspect of life can be turned into a poem or song. He gave us the background to many of the poems from this collection, which he then recited; and he also showed how the style of the verse influenced the way a song was performed. To prove how easy it was to turn everyday experience into verse, he made up as he went along a series of verses telling the story of why he was late getting to the meeting, because he'd had to go up and down the street several times to find a place to park his car! The audience was extremely impressed by this display of skill, and for many of us, it was the highlight of the evening.

History Fix

This programme, mainly concerned with the origins of the smallpipes, covered other aspects of Northumberian culture, including a good section on the language, with the ubiquitous Raymond Reed reciting in front of St. Mary's Lighthouse and then teaching presenter Rory McGrath some of our expressions. Rory and the production team were very friendly and well-informed (after Kim had pointed the researchers in the right directions). A video tape of the programme will be shown during the Yule Meet.

Brian is also NLS representative to the NECC, which has produced recommendations for a regional assembly, and is a member of the Working Group looking into "Maximising Democratic Participation". He will report developments in future issues of the newsletter. It is coming across clearly, at this early stage, that there is a demand for an assembly similar to the devolved Scottish Parliament, that this demand springs from a strong sense of identity (in which language plays its part) and feeling of alienation from Westminster politics and that people are heartily sick of adversarial party politics and want a more consensual form of government on which the individual citizen can have a direct influence. Anyone with anything relevant to raise can reach Brian on the above number.

(While the NLS is a non-political society, the NECC includes culture in its remit and surely we should be keeping an eye on any group which claims to speak for the cultural sector.)
