## **Society News**

Our Treasurer, Hazel Dickson, hasn't been ower grand recently, but she's getting better, and she would like to thank all those members who have sent her their best wishes. It's been very much appreciated.

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Since the last edition of the Newsletter, we've been represented at four different events - three in Alnwick, and one in Berwick.

We went to the Northumberland Millennium Festival Weekend at Alnwick Castle over the last weekend in June, Alnwick Fair on Monday 26 June, Berwick Medieval Fair on Saturday 15 July, and finally, we were back at Alnwick on Saturday 12 August for the Alnwick Castle Country Fair.

We were lucky with the weather at all of these events, and we met a lot of people, gave away plenty of publicity material about the Society and our events, and sold a reasonable amount of our merchandise.

The most important part of our involvement in all of these events is that we raised the profile of the Society. We talked to people about the Northumbrian language. They were able to hear it as well, either in performance, or on tape. And we exchanged views and opinions about the origins of words.

Taking part in these events can be tiring, but the contacts we make are worth the effort. We are the guardians of the language, and we must get out and about to spread the word about it. Please come and join us if you can - it's good fun!

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On Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> August we held a Saint Oswaldtide church service entirely in Northumbrian. This took place at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Ashington, and about a hundred people attended. The idea was Hazel Dickson's, and several members of the Society helped by translating texts and hymns. The whole service was conducted in the language, and many people said how much they'd enjoyed it. There was specially-composed music on the harp and the pipes, and we finished off with tea and biscuits. It was a thoroughly enjoyable experience. Thanks to everyone who supported the event.
